#### **Editorial**

Oh, to be in England now that April's there
And whoever wakes in England sees, some morning, unaware,
That the lowest boughs and the brushwood sheaf
Round the elm-tree bole are in tiny leaf,
While the chaffinch sings on the orchard bough
In England – now!

....so speak the opening lines of 'Home Thought's from Abroad' by Robert Browning (1812-89). With only a passing knowledge of poetry, many people will be familiar with these words and the sentiment outlined which reflect for many the gentle beauty and spirit of the month of April, the arrival of spring and new life with the darkness and hardships of winter now passed.

In addition to looking forward to the Easter celebrations in mid-month together with a couple of Bank Holidays, St George's Day is marked on 23<sup>rd</sup> of the month.

It is difficult to separate fact from legend when looking at England's patron saint but he was likely to have been a soldier of the Eastern Roman army, possibly having been born in Turkey around 280 AD. He rose to prominence during the Tudor period following the Crusades and the Hundred Years War and effectively usurped Edward the Confessor as patron saint. He is most famous for killing a dragon and saving a princess. His popularity declined somewhat during the 18<sup>th</sup> century but recent years have seen a revival in his fortunes. However, we share him - he is patron saint of many places including Amersfoort in the Netherlands, Malta, Genoa in Italy and the neighbouring regions of Aragon and Catalonia in Spain.

In Catalonia there is a romantic element to St George's Day ('La Diada



de Sant Jordi' in Catalan), similar to our Valentine's Day. There is an exchange of gifts – roses for the ladies and books for the men, though it is not restricted to sweethearts – 'roses for love and a book forever'. In Barcelona hundreds of stalls pop up selling roses and books and by the end of the day across the region it is estimated that some four million roses and 400,000 books will have been sold – half the annual book sales across Catalonia.

Hi! April is now upon us and you should not begin to notice shrubs and trees beginning to come back to life after a cold winter. It's since to hear the birds singing the dawn choru and to see the Swallows and House Martin returning after their winter migration to Africa. The warmth and spring rains now will bring huge increases in the populations of slug and snails which can cause a great deal of



damage to plants. Use organic spread slug pellets around the base of plants, there is no need to put a lot of pellets as it doesn't take many to kill off slugs. If you garden organically, use a beer trap, a jar sunk in the ground with the lip just above the surface, filled with beer which will attract slugs. Set aside a morning or afternoon to do those small jobs that make a difference. By hoeing your borders weekly you will keep weeds under control, if you don't weeds grow too big and take away goodness from plants. If they seed you will get even more next year! Keep your lawns mown weekly now gradually reduce the height of the cut and by May it will be safe to cut at your desired height. When you mow a large lawn cut it in different directions, it's nice to see a



chequered board effect. This is a good time to plant evergreen hedges also its a good time to plant container grown trees and shrubs. Remember to water in well after planting. Prune Forsythias and Chaenomeles after they have finished flowering, you can be very severe when pruning as they will flower better next year. Clematis should now be growing well, keep

any new shoots tied in well as if there is any wind they will snap off. Any spring flowering bulbs like Daffodils can now be dead headed; if this is to help goodness to go back into the bulb.

I hope you continue to enjoy your time in the garden, more news next month.



#### The Stag Beetle

They are big they look scary but are quite harmless! Stag beetles are up to 8cm long: and only one UK beetle is bigger and that is a water beetle. They are one of our most spectacular insects, named because the male's large jaws look just like the antlers of a stag. They have an



unusual life cycle, and this lasts several years (this can be anywhere from three to seven years depending on the weather) - and this means they are vulnerable to predators and habitat destruction. This is because they spend most of their life underground as larvae, only emerging for a few weeks to find a mate and reproduce- and then die.

Although the male beetles appear to have huge antlers, they are actually over-sized mandibles, used in courtship displays and to wrestle other male beetles. Adults tend to be seen flying at dusk in the summer looking for a mate. They are also seen during the day on the ground apparently life-less, but actually resting. Female beetles are smaller at between 30-50mm long, with smaller mandibles. They are often seen on the ground looking for somewhere to lay their eggs.

A fully-grown stag beetle larva (grub) can be up to 110mm long. They're fairly smooth skinned, have orange head and legs and brown jaws. They are nearly always found below ground and can be as deep as half a metre down.

The life of the adult stag beetle is somewhat tragic: having spent many months developing underground they emerge to briefly fly, mate then die. Periods of very cold weather can extend the process. Once fully grown, the larvae leave the rotting wood they've been feeding on to build a large cocoon in the soil where they pupate and finally metamorphose into an adult. Adults spend the winter underground in the soil and usually emerge from mid-May onwards. By the end of August, most of them will have died. They do not survive the winter.

Greatly misunderstood the stag beetle is under great threat from extinction. Mainly because of habitat loss but also through ignorance: people sometimes seem to think it is dangerous or a foreign invader and stamp on them for they are often docile and slumber or are prostrate during the day and mistaken for dead. The larvae also are

not especially handsome, and people often kill them thinking them a danger. There was also a false tradition in Northern cultures associating it with the devil- claiming they started fires by carrying live embers in the mandibles!

Mythology tells us of Cerambus who was a shepherd living on the slopes of Mount Orthrys who had a beautiful voice and was skilled in the pan pipes - so much so that the nymphs would come and listen to him. Sadly, he quarrelled with the gods who in spite turned him into a stag beetle.

If you see one please just move it to a place of safety off the road or pathways for example and let it be. It only has a short time to live and ensure the next generation of these wonderful and exotic looking creatures.

#### The Night Sky in April

After three consecutive months where we had the ability to view a supermoon, we return to the regular pattern of lunar activity as we will not see another until March and April next year, though we will have eight years to wait until we witness one as bright as that last February. Our darker winter skies which aid sky watching are now receding but the rest of the year will have plenty of celestial activity for us to view.



April sees two meteor showers, the first being the Lyrids between 16<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> of the month, peaking on 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> at about eighteen per hour in the north eastern sky. The meteors are fast and leave persistent trains and are remnants of Comet Thatcher discovered in 1861. The Eta Aquirids are a stronger shower which becomes active around midmonth and peaks during the middle of May towards the eastern sky with a maximum hourly rate of 55.

An interesting sight occurs in the western sky on 8 April at around 10.00pm when Mars can be located a few degrees directly above the low crescent moon. Just to the right of these can be located a small cluster of stars known as the Pleiades, also known as the Seven Sisters, though this is something of a misnomer as only six are visible to the naked eye. This is one of the closest star clusters to Earth at a distance of 442 light years. Having once identified this small misty cluster it will be easy for people to identify it in future night skies. The following evening, 9 April, at the same time, the moon will be directly above the star Aldebaran with its reddish tint, the brightest star in the constellation of Taurus. Mars continues to be visible in the north western sky until it sets around midnight. At around 1.00am Jupiter rises towards the south east and blazes brilliantly in the night sky.

# Calne Without Annual Parish Council Meeting 11th March 2019

The Parish Council was pleased to welcome so many residents to the Annual Parish meeting on the evening of the 11<sup>th</sup> March 2019. Residents heard the Chairman's review of last year and a presentation on the Council's proposed spending for the upcoming year 2019/20 and the rationale behind it. Councillors were able to answer questions and ask for residents to become involved in bringing forward projects for consideration. PCSO Mark Cook reported on the community policing in the area and asked residents to keep a watch on any vulnerable neighbours and emphasised how important the knowledge and watchful eye of the local community is to the police.

Residents brought up a number of topics including concerns about the Chippenham to Calne footpath/cycle path, traffic issues in Stockley, parking in Derry Hill, building in and around Calne and the pressure that it puts on the surrounding areas. Road safety issues connected to the new pedestrian crossing on the A4 at Studley were also brought forward. Parish Councillors, Wiltshire Unitary Councillor Christine Crisp and PCSO Mark Cook were able to provide some answers and a number of issued will now be followed up both by the police and the Parish Council.

On the whole we decided that although this book would make a good holiday read it was not sufficiently well realised to stand up to critical analysis.



Dear Friends,

A favourite hymn of mine is "Now the green blade riseth from the buried grain"\*. According to teacher and writer Alan E. Lewis this is "the only truly authentic



Easter hymn...It speaks of hope...present in all our Holy Saturdays of death and despair, ready to push through and grow once more in the shape of God's love."

The hymn was written by John Macleod Campbell Crum (1872-1958) and set to the hauntingly beautiful 15<sup>th</sup> century French tune Noël Nouvelet. Crum's words take us on the journey with Jesus through the aftermath of Good Friday as Jesus ("Love") is "laid in the earth like grain that sleeps unseen", and then through the emptiness and silence of grief of Holy Saturday. However, the constant refrain of hope at the end of each verse reminds us that death does not have the last word "Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green."

The Easter message is clear in the opening line "Now the green blade riseth..." telling us that Jesus is risen, as on that first Easter morning. "Love lives again..." reminds us that in Jesus, God came to live in the world he loves so much and speaks of death and resurrection. For me, the words of the final verse resonate particularly powerfully at the moment:

"When our hearts are wintry, grieving, or in pain, Thy touch can call us back to life again; Fields of our hearts that dead and bare have been: Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green."

Alan E. Lewis noted that "God's aloneness and despair on Holy Saturday is precisely that part of the Easter story that most closely mirrors so much of our own human experience." When we are wrestling with the hard and difficult things which life sometimes throws at us, I take comfort and strength from the promise that: "[Jesus'] touch can call us back to life again."

Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green. May I wish you all a joyful and blessed Easter.






