Editorial

Whilst writing this piece at the beginning of February, there is noticeably more evening light and this process will continue during the month until the start of British Summer Time on 31 March gives things a hefty push. In the US clocks change on 10 March in all states apart from Hawaii and Arizona, though a small part of the latter does change.



Apart from greater evening light, the piece is

being written during a prolonged snowstorm at the start of February, which reminded me that March last year saw significant winter weather events. Firstly, there was 'The Beast from the East' which began with an exceptionally cold and prolonged easterly airflow towards the latter part of February with widespread snow and daytime temperatures below freezing into the early days of March. This was followed by a combination of a 'Mini Beast from the East' and Storm Emma in midmonth which brought further chaos, mostly in the South and South West. What eventually followed of course was plenty of heat and sunshine in late spring and early summer.

No matter what the weather throws at us, we can look forward to St David's Day and St Patrick's Day on 1st and 17th March respectively. 5th March also sees Shrove Tuesday or Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday, traditionally the last day of feasting before the start Lent.

The 15th of the month witnesses 'The Ides of March', the date in 44 BC on which Julius Caesar was assassinated by as many as 60 conspirators led by Brutus and Cassius and which lead to great upheaval and war within the Roman Empire. The Roman calendar did not really number their days but the 'Ides' effectively signified the middle of each month. The Ides usually corresponded with the 13th day of each month but was two days later for the months of March, May, July and October. Caesar was warned by a soothsayer that he would come to harm on that date, hence the phrase 'Beware the Ides of March'. This year, Comic Relief's fund-raising Red nose Day coincides with the Ides.

March is here and Spring is just around the corner. You should be seeing signs of new life now in the garden. But be careful, we can still have some cold weather and frosts. The lawns will start to grow so it's now a good time to scarify the lawns to get rid of all the thatch that has built over the



winter. After you have done this give the lawn a feed that will last for 6 months. It should also include a weed killer to kill unwanted weeds in the lawn. It's a good time to apply a good layer of mulch on all borders. Before applying the mulch feed borders with blood fish and bone fertiliser. Do not put mulch on your borders if the ground is frozen as this will keep the soil cold. You can now prune fig trees. If you grow a fig against a wall tie in as much new growth as possible and fan out. Take any old figs that are still on but leave any figs that are a size of a pea this is this year's fruit. Spray winter wash to all fruit trees this will get rid of all the insect eggs that harbour over winter. Any spring bulbs will now start to grow and soon be blooming in a month's time. Keep an eye out for any blind tulips, if you see some dig out the bulbs and throw them away. Start now to ventilate the greenhouses on a sunny warm day. Begin to feed all greenhouse plants on a weekly basis; this will ensure that the plants get off to a good start. Start now to sow all your bedding plants in the greenhouses. Start planning your garden now for the summer. Enjoy your time in the garden more news next month.

Annual Caine Without Parish Council Meeting

It's been an important year of change for the council., it's tried harder to inform and engage more with residents and has much greater ambitions to improve facilities in the area. Whilst the council has approved its highest ever council tax increase (126%), it's still one of the lowest in the area but it now has plans to invest in schemes to address problem areas and improve our environment.

The parish council has finally proposed changes to the bizarre ward boundaries but unsuccessfully objected to Hills proposals to reroute thousands of additional lorries through our villages. The council is developing a Transport Strategy for the Calne Area; it's consulting on its proposals for waiting restrictions in Church Road and considering a speed limit for Studley. Many people are far from happy at the way Wiltshire Council has let down residents by the way it has managed the Bowood Gate housing development.

Why not come along on March 11th to express your views and ask questions. The annual meeting is from 7 until 8pm followed immediately by the monthly parish council meeting which will consider items including the problems caused by school parking in Church Road.

Governance of Chippenham Forest

After the Norman Invasion of 1066 the life of our ancestors changed dramatically for the worst - for over two and half of agricultural centuries. The economy enabled ordinary folk to access the forests: to forage, graze livestock, hunt small prey, cut turves and wood to support their existence. It was carefully based around the local economy. Suddenly this changed and it became a brutally punishable crime to enter or make use of the forests, which were now the king's personal possession governed under the dreaded "Forest Law".



Each royal forest was kept by a Warden. The Wiltshire forest wardens held office by letters patent under the great seal - and commonly after the 13th century, for life. All except the Warden of Braydon farmed their offices and paid a tithe to Salisbury Cathedral. Perquisites claimed by the wardens included certain rights of taking wood in the forest (housebote and haybote, dead and windfallen wood, and the top and lop of trees felled) and cheminage, herbage and pannage rights, honey and nuts, the profits of minor pleas, escapes of cattle and the lawing of dogs, and the right to hunt such beasts as hares and foxes.

Under the Wardens were Foresters in fee, who held their lands by serjeanty of keeping the wards or subdivisions of the forests. In the 13th and 14th centuries there were 4 foresters in fee in Savernake Forest, one each for the West Bailiwick, Bedwyn Brails, Southgrove, and Hippenscombe. The Warden of Clarendon had 6 foresters in fee under him - 3 for Clarendon Forest and Park, 1 for Melchet Park, and 2 for Grovely Forest.

Subordinate Foresters, some appointed by the Crown, some by the Wardens and some by the Foresters in fee, discharged the duties of gamekeepers, usually on foot. Violent attacks upon the foresters were not infrequent, and the assistance of the Sheriff of Wiltshire and even of the sheriffs of other counties was invoked from time to time to assist them to keep the king's peace and enforce the forest law. There were also Verderers, Regarders, and Agisters elected in the county court from amongst those who held land in free tenure in the forest. Finally, every owner of a wood within the forest metes was bound to appoint a Woodward to keep vert and venison therein.

The juries of Wiltshire knights summoned in 1279 to make perambulations of the forests complained bitterly of infractions of the Forest Charter. The foresters purchased their appointments, so that the Wardens were said to appoint more than were necessary. The Jurors' estimates on this point, however, were



conservative. They declared that the Constable of Marlborough on horseback with two of his Serjeants had formerly sufficed to keep the whole of Savernake Forest, whereas in fact during the first half of the 13th century there were three foresters for the West Bailiwick alone.


The Foresters obtained benefits by various illegal exactions. For example, collecting lambs and made 'scotales'. The Serjeants of Devizes castle usurped the rights of the sworn Foresters by entering Melksham Forest armed with bows and arrows and taking security from persons accused of forest trespasses; they kept property seized in this way unless it were promptly redeemed. The Foresters of Melksham sold the king's wood 'to the great injury of the lord the king and of the whole countryside'. The Constable of Marlborough castle was accused of illegally hearing pleas of trespasses in Savernake. Law was arbitrary justice on the whim of those in power. The feudal system could often be a vicious pyramid which kicked downwards, and each power level preyed on those lower down. We would do well to remember and enact my observation that the price of freedom and justice is vigilance and cooperation.

The Night Sky in March

Spring is here! Meteorological Spring begins on the first day of the month whilst astronomical Spring begins with the Vernal Equinox which occurs on March when the sun passes the celestial equator into the northern hemisphere and when the hours of daylight and darkness are almost identical. These hours of light and dark



change most rapidly around the period of the two equinoxes in March and September so we will have plenty of light evenings in the months ahead as astronomical spring lasts for some 92.74 days. At the time of equinox, the distance between the earth and sun is almost 150m kilometres. To add to the arrival of spring, British Summer Time begins at 1.00am on 31 March so clocks should go forward an hour.

We will also enjoy another supermoon this month when the full moon coincides with the moon's closest point to earth in its orbit (at perigee) on 21 March. At 359,000 km it will not be as close to us as it was for the February supermoon however and consequently not quite as bright.

The Orion constellation will still be visible in the western sky during the month but is drifting away and will soon disappear until its return to our night skies in late autumn.

Planetary activity is mostly limited to the pre-dawn skies with Jupiter being a particularly prominent beacon low in the southern sky. At 5.00am on 28 and 29 March, Saturn, the Moon and Jupiter will be strung close together in the south east/southern sky. At the beginning of the month, again low in the south eastern sky. Mars remains visible in the evening sky towards the west, but its reddish light continues to fade as it moves away from earth.



Electoral Roll - Christ Church Derry Hill

The Electoral Roll has to be revised annually, but every six years a completely new Roll has to be compiled. This means that everyone who wishes to be included on the list needs to complete an application form. These can be obtained from the **Village Stores**, **Church porch or Mrs M Hogarth**, Electoral Roll Officer.

To be entitled to be included on the Roll a person must be: Baptised.

Over 16 years of age on or before 7th April 2019.

A Member of the Church of England resident in the parish.

A Member of the Church of England not resident in the parish but attending Christ Church regularly.

A Member of a Roman Catholic, Baptist, Methodist, URC church who are prepared to declare themselves a member of the Church of England and have attended worship for at least six months in the parish.

In order to serve on the Parochial Church Council or vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting you need to be on the Electoral Roll. This is an ideal opportunity to have an input into the running of the church and its life within the village.

The closing date for completion of the Roll is 23rd March 2019.



A gentleman in Moscow

It is rare for everyone in the Derry Hill book group to thoroughly enjoy and not be able to find fault with a book that we have shared. A couple of people felt that the story 'took its time' but this is a book to savour and not hurry through.

The book is structured in a literary 'accordion pattern' Which means from day one of the story the chapters advance by a doubling principle, that is we are told of what is happening on day one, day two, day four, day eight, three weeks later, three months six months and so on. Halfway through the



book the chapters follow a halving principle until we approach denouement.

This Accordion structure is meant to be similar to 'real life'; when we can remember so many events of a single year in our young adulthood but then remember an entire decade as a phase of our career or parenthood etc.

The book is set in Russia from 1922 till 1954 and tells the fictional story of the life of an aristocrat who is 'luckily' incarcerated in a hotel rather than being shot. However, the book also gives a good overview of the real political situation of that time and we would recommend that you buy a 'proper' paper book to read this novel, as the Kindle version does not contain all the very informative postscripts.

The protagonist, Count Rostov, is a joy to get to know as he overcomes his situation with grace, compassion and humour. Wonderful relationships are developed with others who work, reside, and visit the hotel.

This novel elegantly captures that most opposite of life lessons:

'By the smallest of one's actions, one can restore some sense of order to the world'

We hope others will also enjoy this charming, philosophical masterpiece.

Dear Friends,

"I invite you... in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word." So begins the service on Ash Wednesday (6th March) when we are all invited to share our journey through Lent. One of the things I love about the



Anglican church is the rhythm of the seasons; Ash Wednesday signals a change in mood when we are encouraged to prepare for a period of Lenten discipline, making space for honest reflection, rediscovering a life of simplicity.

During the season of Lent there is a sense of paring things back. You may notice that there are no flowers in church during Lent. The liturgy is also pared back; we do not sing the Gloria or hymns with alleluias; there is more time for silence. The altar frontal and vestments are purple – the colour of penitence; although some churches have Lent array, which is simple linen. The idea is to provide a contrast, before the bursting forth of joyful alleluias at Easter.

So, back to Ash Wednesday. During the service we are invited to receive the sign of the cross in ash on our forehead (the imposition of ashes). There is a tradition of making the ash from the palm crosses used at the previous year's Palm Sunday service. This is quite an art, and I do not recommend stir frying palm crosses as a colleague once tried. Fortunately, we are blessed with a churchwarden (Peter Rigby) who has perfected the art of producing ash of just the right consistency. Unfortunately, he has not shared his secret with me!

There is something quite profound that happens in that moment when the cross of ash is marked on your forehead and you hear the words: "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ." I will receive the mark of the ash from another person before I mark others — a reminder that this ministry is from one sinner to another. At the end of the imposition of ashes, there is a prayer of forgiveness. In this moment we are reminded of who we are in every aspect of our human nature; we are reminded of whose we are as dearly beloved children of a loving God. We are reminded of what it means to keep a holy Lent; to be signed with the cross, yes, but

also to take up the cross as we journey to Calvary, and beyond to Easter.

I wonder what that means for you? It would be good to have a conversation during Lent. With love and prayers for a holy Lent,


All new members will be given a little introduction, but it is important to know that there are no experts! We all begin again each time we turn up.


